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SCHOOL MISSION

 \mathbf{K} eeping in step with the spirit of Jesus Christ our Lord, our mission is to provide students with an all-round education aimed at excellence in spiritual, ethical, intellectual, physical, inter-personal and aesthetic development.

We aim at cultivating our students with the qualities of a **LAMWOOER**: leadership, ardour, modesty, wisdom, optimism, originality, empathy and responsibility.

I. OUR SCHOOL

1. General Introduction of the School

Our school is an English grammar school, established by the Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui in 1970. It is an aided whole-day, co-educational secondary school.

Our school is housed in a 6-storey main building with 3 wings. There are 33 classrooms and 20 special rooms: a school hall, a lecture theatre, a library, a gymnasium, a fitness room, a computer room, a multi-media collaborative learning center, a geography information system room, an oral recording center, an English corner, an English studio, a little chapel, 4 science laboratories, a music room, an art room, a home economics room and a design and technology workshop, together with an open playground and a covered playground. Computers and LCD projectors are installed in all classrooms and special rooms. Smartboards are installed in some classrooms and special rooms as well. Accommodation and facilities are well maintained. The buildings and even the canteen are kept clean, tidy and are fully air-conditioned.

Owing to the high academic performance of our students, our school is one of the top schools in the Kwai Ching District and one of the top secondary schools in Hong Kong.

2. School Management

1. The School Management Committee

The School Management Committee consists of 10 members with Rt. Rev. Chan Au Ming Andrew as the Chairman, Dr Alice Yuk as the School Supervisor and Mr Cheung Chee Yin as the Hon, Treasurer.

2. Staff

There were 67 teaching staff members (including the Principal), 3 laboratory technicians, 10 clerical staff, 4 assistant teachers, 3 technical support staff and 9 janitors.

3. Qualifications of the Principal and Teachers in Staff Establishment

- i. 98.3% obtained a bachelor's degree.
- ii. 73.3% obtained a master's degree.
- iii. 3.3% obtained a doctor's degree.
- iv. 100% received formal teacher training.

4. Professional Development of the Principal and Teachers

To act as the role models of lifelong learning for students, our teachers attended professional courses to improve themselves. Below are those completing their courses in this academic year:

5. Staff Development Committee

Various programs including staff development days, an induction program, the mentoring scheme and team building activities were organized throughout the academic year.

On the staff development days, we arranged various talks and workshops. In order to reduce the stress and work pressure of our staff, we conducted an Art Therapy workshop run by the Whole Person Development Institute. Meanwhile, a mosaic production was constructed by teachers to decorate the school for the purpose of team collaboration. In the program "Quality school Improvement Project: Support for Learning Diversity", we had a joint-school learning and teaching workshop about learner diversity organized by CUHK. For the review on MC1 and MC2 session, the teachers found that it promoted team building, established the common vision and put educational beliefs into practice. For the half-day retreat, the staff stated that they gained useful teaching and learning insights from the integration of the online EDB materials with the school curriculum. The teachers valued such an informal and pleasant opportunity to communicate and enjoyed the retreat very much.

Our mentorship scheme has been implemented for many years to develop the professionalism of the new teachers and teaching assistants. Seven teachers were appointed as the mentors to give advice and support to the new teaching staff in this academic year.

In order to establish the close links with tertiary teacher training institutions and to nurture the next generations of teachers, we arranged teaching practices for student teachers from tertiary institutions. This academic year, we had the school-university partnership with HKU. Three student teachers of Chemistry, Chinese Language and English Language from HKU, and one student teacher of Biology from the University of British Columbia completed their teaching practice in our school.

To promote a sharing culture among our teaching staff, the first 10 minutes of each staff development day was used for teachers' sharing. Teachers were invited to share their experiences which enhanced our mutual understanding and broadened our horizons.

The staff development fund, set up by the School Management Committee, encouraged and subsidized our colleagues to enroll in the courses related to teaching or well-being purposes.

In short, the staff development activities this year have achieved the goal of enhancing the personal development and professionalism of our colleagues.

6. Teacher Commendation Scheme

To acknowledge outstanding teachers and show respect to teachers, the Committee of 'Respect Our Teachers Campaign' organized the 18th Teacher Commendation Scheme. Ms. Lee Siu Mei and Mr. Cheng Hong Yung were nominated by the students and teaching staff respectively as our school's nominees.

- To provide reports, statistics and analysis on academic results to Academic Division.
- To assist colleagues to improve their work efficiency by maintaining various school-based software.

II. ACHIEVEMENTS AND REFLECTION ON MAJOR CONCERNS

Priority 1: Active Learning

The ultimate goal of Major Concern 1 is to allow students to internalize the importance / joy of learning so that they would acquire knowledge actively themselves. To achieve this, we aim at enhancing their learning motivation, providing them with an environment to learn actively and to equip them with necessary skills.

Area 1: Motivating students to learn from role models and peers

1.1 Thematic talks about goal setting, perseverance and persistence for whole school

- A whole-school thematic talk on boosting goal setting, perseverance and persistence was given by Mr. Cheng Wing King (Vice Principal of Christian Zheng Sheng College, also our alumnus). He shared the blood, sweat and tears in developing the college.
- The feedback of the talk was positive, as reflected by the audience and the opinions in the interim evaluation meeting.
- Majority of the staff reflected that it is worthwhile to keep these thematic talks. At the same time, it was suggested that we could invite speakers who had mediocre performance during their school life so that their experience cold be shared by most of the students.

1.2 Study skills / strategy talks

2 Talks on active preparation for DSE were given by Principal Ip Cho Yin (2 times, for F.5 &6) and 4 talks on study skill for F.4- F.6 were given by alumni. They were largely welcomed. From interim evaluation meetings and feedbacks from students after the talks, both teachers and students agreed that the talks were useful in building students' habit in preparing for public exams. At the same time, it was agreed there could also be talks for study skills / study habits for F.1-F.3.

Conjecture and follow-ups for 1.1 and 1.2:

In general, the talks were largely welcomed. Both teachers and students thought they were meaningful in boosting active mind and cultivating good learning habits. Similar arrangement would be carried out next year with the addition of more junior form talks.

1.3 Goal setting (F.1-F.5)

- 1.31 The program was divided into 3 stages this year: beginning of term (planning), after UT (mid-way review) and after mid-term (evaluation). 3 Form teacher periods were assigned for these. Students were asked to discuss with the form teachers on the progress of they plan during Form Teacher period and the teacher-student conference.
- 1.32 Form teachers were invited to complete a questionnaire on the effect of the program and students' learning attitude after the program.
 - From the surveys, teachers' opinions towards the effect of the program were diversified. Teachers in general agreed that it helped give students a clearer direction to themselves. Around 40-50% teachers agreed that students took the initiative to achieve their goals / were able to adopt different methods to achieve their goals (with around 40% being neutral). They suggested that students need more debriefings on the meaning of goal setting and how to achieve their goals.

Conjecture and follow-up: Goal setting program is meaningful. The program should better be structured to let the students understand better the meaning of goal setting and attitude / skills to achieve their goals. MC1 committee would follow-up the opinions. In 1415 academic year,

MC1 would collaborate with CS to integrate life planning elements into goal setting to make the program more structured and effective.

1.4 Life stories in RS lessons to boost Active Learning

The story of Hong Kong Bicycle Team was used for discussion in senior form RS lessons. The feedbacks received from evaluation meeting were positive. Same arrangement would be proposed to RS department in 1415.

Area 2: Creating an active learning environment

2.1 Strengthening reading and self-learning culture

Reading To Learning Team (RTL) helped prepare links to selected online courses. These courses were video taped lectures of various universities. The listed were selected to fit the ability of our students. However, due to the restructure of both the reading lessons and manpower of the team, the courses were not very well promoted. At the same time, some of the reading lessons were occupied by other activities such as programs from Guidance Section.

On the other hand, library record showed there was a rather drastic drop in number of books borrowed. Similar situation was also found in another school with similar background. The primary survey by library showed that a considerable proportion of students tended to opt for e-text and their answer indicated they did not read significantly less.

This phenomenon is worth further investigation. Library would keep an eye on the reading habit of students and carry out another survey to have a fuller picture on this.

2.2 e-Learning

- 2.21 Liberal Studies continued as the pilot subject for e-learning in F.2 and F.4. With well-designed activities, the program ran smoothly. The advantages of mobile learning were largely utilized: able to assign personalized tasks, allow real-time present-feedback process, allow multi-media texts etc. At the same time, challenges were observed. High achievers found this mode of learning more beneficial while the others found it demanding in terms of language ability and response time. The uncertainties from not-teacher-elected sources and the promptness required to students' questions were also challenging to teachers.
- 2.22 Technical and hardware limitation still existed as one of the main obstacles for promoting e-learning. Though with the full support from IT team on technical problems and logistics, limiting number of laptops, rather complicated wiring, and sometimes unpredictable network problems deterred teachers from committing in using mobiles in routine teaching.
- 2.23 To solve the problem, we applied for the pilot program "Support Scheme for e-learning in Schools", aiming at improving our infrastructure with the fund. During the application process, a focus group of parents and middle-managers were consulted. A consensus was formed that the school should be cautious towards the pace and scale of implementing e-learning: to keep it within a few subjects and invite only interested teachers to join. At the same time, to prepare for the future e-learning trend and explore more interactive learning modes, resources would still be allocated to the program to keep it. The application turned out unsuccessful. However, during the period, more teachers and departments (English, IS, CL and Physics) showed willingness to explore more in e-learning.

Conjecture and follow-up:

• 10 tablets, which were lighter, faster to set up and no wiring involved, were purchased in response to the hardware problem. 10 more would be purchased for year 2014-15. A trial-run using the tablets was arranged in June 2014 in a summer course. Both teachers and students were satisfied with the convenience brought by the new device.

- There would be a meeting(s) for the interested teachers to share the experience in using the devices and to discuss the implementation plan. Focus of discussion would be placed on interactive learning. Flip-teaching would be explored.
- Principal and some middle managers would pay a visit to Pui Ching Middle school to learn from their experience in e-learning.
- An experienced educator would be invited to deliver a talk on e-learning in lessons during pre-term meeting.

2.3 Making use of data to improve the implementation of Active Learning

2.31 Lesson observation

- To have a complete picture on teaching and learning of the school, a special arrangement was made for lesson observation: Principal and academic section heads, if available, accompanied the panel head to observe the lessons. Brief discussions of the observers were followed to figure out a general picture on teaching and learning of the whole school.
- An experienced inspector was invited to share with the panel heads the skills of lesson observation.
- In general, the lessons were well-structured. Objectives were clearly stated and the presentations were clear. Students were attentive and able to follow the instructions well. At the same time, though questioning was common in the lessons, the questions could be more challenging to provoke thinking. Students participated actively in discussions and pair works, but they seldom raised questions. The findings were reported in staff meetings. Teachers were advised to improve in these areas.

2.32 Course evaluation

- Course evaluation has been conducted every year to evaluate teaching and learning effectiveness. To reduce burden on students, 3-4 subjects from junior forms and 4-5 from senior forms were chosen for data collection. The overall data was forward to departments and schools for follow-ups while the individual data was returned to concerned teachers for self-reflection.
- Cross-year comparison: questions related to students' self-reflection on learning motivation and active learning elements, as well as feedbacks on learning atmosphere created by teachers (see appendix for questions). For fair comparison, only core subjects were selected as some electives may not be chosen in particular year.

Conjecture:

- 1. There was a slight increase in motivation in senior forms. The value in the whole school was quite high.
- 2. Students rated high for the learning environment which showed that teachers' effort in giving clear instruction and being helpful. At the same time, there was a slight decrease in this item for the junior forms.
- 3. There was room for improvement regarding the active learning elements for the students in both forms.

Conjecture:

- 1. In general, Lam Woo students scored significantly higher than the territory norm in nearly all items related to academic matters.
- 2. Senior form students demonstrated improvements in all academic aspects. In some items, they scored even high than those of the junior forms. This is quite different from the past data in our school and the territory norm.

Conjecture:

- 1. There was quite significant increase in teachers' scores which implied teachers had more awareness of improving students' study skill and active participation.
- 2. On the other hand, students' feedback on teachers' performance in questioning, teaching of study skills and variety of learning activities decreased generally when compared with last survey.

2.35 Interim evaluation workshop

- 1. An interim evaluation workshop was organized by SDC in June 2014 on school major concerns. Teachers were grouped by departments to evaluate the programs carried out using the KISS (Keep, Improve, Stop, Start) framework.
- 2. Teachers in general agreed that most items should be kept. There were some suggestions to refine peer mentorship, goal setting, talks etc. Adjustments responding to the opinions would be reflected in the year plan of 1415.

2.36 Data summary and follow-ups

- 1. Students' self-reflection: in general scored quite high in motivation, and academic self-concepts. At the same time, senior forms showed significant improvements while junior forms score either showed small increase or even slight decrease. The thematic talks and smaller class structure may contribute to the result.
- 2. Teachers' self-reflection: awareness and self-concept on improving questioning skills and providing more active learning environments was increased. The absolute values were high as well. Structured professional developments, constant reminders in staff and department meetings and focused lesson observation may account for this.
- 3. Students' opinion on teachers' work: they in general appreciated teachers' effort in delivering concepts clearly and being kind and helpful. However, their feedback also suggested that teachers could ask more challenging questions, engage them more in lessons, and teach them related study skills.

4. Follow-ups:

- The motivation boosting activities should be kept. Those for the junior forms should be strengthened.
- Teachers need to ask more challenging questions and arrange more active learning activities.
 These are to be enforced through peer learning such as co-planning (e.g. with focus on
 questioning) and lesson observation, understanding students' need from various evaluations and
 professional developments.

Area 3: Promoting active learning through teaching

3.1 Co-planning

Nearly all departments conducted co-planning with at least one form involved. The activity aimed at making learning activities more active through group effort. Math and science subjects put their focuses on project learning and investigative study. Language and humanity subjects mainly chose group work and presentation, e-learning, field-trips or mini projects as their tasks. The feedbacks from the departments were general positive. Professional exchange from peers was enhanced and most lessons co-planned received encouraging responses.

3.2 Other active learning elements conducted

Pre-lesson assignments, note-taking and study skills were observed in the implementation plan of some subjects. While considering the importance, limitation and efforts required to mplement these activities, note-taking would be strengthened next year.

3.3 Professional development

Two professional developments related to academic matters were conducted this year. One aimed at catering for learner diversity, was organized by CUHK. The other one focused on key points for lesson observation and giving constructive feedbacks, was delivered by Principal Yip to the senior and middle managers.

Both received positive feedbacks.

Conclusion:

- 1. Overall speaking, students' performance in various aspect in academic was encouraging when stepping into the second year of implementing Major Concerns. On average, around 70% of students agreed they employed active learning strategies. Their performance in APASO was significantly higher than territory norm.
- 2. In general, students and teachers welcomed the motivation boosting activities (close or more than 70% of agreement %) in various surveys.
- 3. In general, teachers were well aware of the need to boost active learning. On the other hand,

there was still room for teachers to improve in delivering active lessons.

- 4. In general, the objectives in 1314 were largely achieved.
- 5. Follow-ups needed for 1415:
 - Introduce more study skill programs for junior form
 - Amend and enhance goal setting and e-learning
 - Re-structure reading lessons and have a better understanding on reading trend
 - More focused co-planning, e.g. questioning
 - More structured study of e-learning

Priority 2: Character Building

It was the second year of the MC2 – Character Building. The focus of this year was on Playing a proper role, Politeness and Thankfulness.

Objectives:

- 1. To enhance students' awareness and understanding of their different roles and the need to play a proper role.
- 2. To enable students to enhance their politeness in the interpersonal relationship of daily school life
- 3. To provide training for teachers, parents and students in value education
- 4. To cultivate an atmosphere of Character Building in the lower form students
- 5. To establish the tradition of old students from school helping the junior students and infiltrate the values from the Bible

Area 1: Enhancing students' awareness and understanding of their different roles and the need to play a proper role.

Section Heads or teacher-in-charge of the DS, ECS, GS, MCES, PRS, Student Union and Christian Fellowship helped their executives, members or helpers to understand the various roles students take and play their proper roles. Subject departments, especially language subjects, RE and LS, adopted teaching and learning activities to infiltrate these virtues and values. The school promoted the specific values through informal curriculum. This Involved both form teachers and students in goal setting on playing a proper role in Form Teacher periods and Teacher-student conference. School Assemblies and Form Morning Assemblies were held to help arouse the students' awareness of the importance of the various virtues and values. They were also led to cultivate an atmosphere of keeping their classroom clean and be thankful to the janitors for their contributions.

Area 2: Enabling students to enhance their politeness in the interpersonal relationship of daily school life

All teachers and school staff were engaged in cultivating and enforcing these values into students in daily school life. Senior form students were encouraged to be role models for practicing politeness in interpersonal relationship. Students were reminded to have good manners in the lesson time and outside lesson activities. Form teachers and subject teachers would promptly remind students the proper behaviors in every occasion. Through programs in Form Morning Assemblies or School Assemblies, more in-depth explanation of politeness and introduction on ways of being polite were brought out. Those good role models were nominated to the Most Polite Student Award.

Area 3: Providing training for teachers, parents and students in value education

The roles of teachers and parents in cultivating students' good manners were enhanced through talks and training workshops. Students were brought to be aware of good manners and pay attention in playing a proper role in workshops, Form Teacher Periods or assemblies.

Area 4: Cultivating an atmosphere of Character Building among the lower form students

F.1 students were brought to the awareness of Character Building through the Character Enhancement Scheme. A group of F.1 students were trained to be Character Ambassadors. They carried out investigation on Character Building in school. They also conveyed the message to promote Character Building in a drama. For the F.2 students, there was a project on Thankfulness to cultivate the awareness of students of being thankful to persons around.

Area 5: Encouraging alumni to help junior students using the values from Bible and thereby make thus a tradition

Through the Leadership With Mentoring Support Scheme, the alumni in the two SKH churches near our school helped to develop our junior form students in Character Building. The series of activities included workshops on leadership training, understanding of history of our school and school founder, connection with the SKH churches, team building activities and training camp.

The rationale and concepts of MC2 are infiltrated into various activities and programs held by sections and committees in MC2, including Christian Fellowship, Discipline Section, Extra-curricular Activity Section, Guidance Section, Moral and Civic Education Section, Pastoral Care and Religious Education Section and the Student Union.

Evaluation and Suggestions

1. Evaluation of Activities

- 1.1 Most Form 1 Form Teachers appreciate the "Conduct Ambassadors Scheme" as it can help spread the message of good conduct. It is suggested that more information should be given to Form Teachers so that they can help promote the program more extensively.
- 1.2 "LWMSS" may not be organized next year. The Church of Epiphany will conduct regional activities instead. Lam Woo students will be encouraged to join the activities.

2. Evaluation of quality of character building among students

- 2.1 Teachers find it difficult to evaluate or quantify the effectiveness of MC2 in every program or activity although most of the programs and activities include the elements of politeness and playing a proper role.
- 2.2 There has been more lack of communication between teachers and students. Students rarely report the progress of the programs or activities held by themselves.
- 2.3 Students are found to be more self-centred and overprotected by teachers. They do not care about the consequence of some misbehaviour and problems and they are too reliant on teachers to deal with the problems once they happened.
- 2.4 It is suggested that more debriefing sessions should be held to reflect on the programs that students have organized.
- 2.5 Teachers are suggested to discover some responsible and reliable students from Junior Forms and cultivate them to be leaders in the future.
- 2.6 More power and autonomy may be given to students so that they learn to be responsible and possess leadership abilities.
- 2.7 Some committee members proposed that value education can be systematically conducted during Form Teacher Period (in day 6 or lesson 2) or School Assemblies in align with the themes of MC2.
- 2.8 Focus of MC2 in 2014-2015 It is proposed that the Major Concern 2 in Junior Form be "Be reliable", while that in Senior Forms be "Be a role model".

III. OUR LEARNING AND TEACHING

1. Academic Division

1.1 Extended learning experiences

Our academic units made regular contacts with other educational bodies to ensure our students could enjoy a broader perspective in their development:

- A large number of students participated in various programs for gifted students (e.g. Membership of the HKAGE, Academy for the Talented in the HKU, Dual program in the HKUST, web-based learning courses by EDB, scholarship from the Johns Hopkins University)
- We offered Japanese, Korean and Spanish language courses to students as extra-curricular activities.
- F.1 students participated in the memory and study skills workshop organized by Academic Enhancement Section.
- After-school tutorial classes and holiday tutorial classes on English and Mathematics were offered to students.
- We were one of the partner school of QEF funded project on gifted education. Our junior form students attended a course on critical thinking held in June 2014.
- Funded by Lam Shui Scholarship, we were able to recruit an extra CNET teacher to enhance English learning.

1.3 Curriculum

- Funded by REES, a bridging program for EMI subjects (Geography, IS, Math and LS) for P.6 to F.1 students was held in July to August. A learning package was developed for future use.
- To help students lay foundations in NSS, Commerce was introduced in F.3 curriculum.

2. Reading to Learn

The Reading to Learn program continued its mission to cultivate a reading habit amongst students and encourage extensive reading. A number of activities were carried out: book crossing, sharing of famous author, seminars and book fairs.

3. IT Team

IT Team continued the work of maintaining an efficient technical support and exploring new technology in assisting learning and teaching. Workshops and sharing sessions were conducted so as to help teachers familiarize with the use of different IT devices in campus. Also, all teachers' desktop computers, desktop computers in classrooms and projectors were replaced. Besides, with the Wifi system introduced in school campus and new mobile devices installed, eLearning activities were introduced to different subjects.

4. Cultural and Art Activities

For junior forms, students' sense of appreciation via the exploration of performances, museums and galleries was enhanced with the guide provided in the "Arts Lover Passport" issued by the Cultural Promotion Committee. Besides a variety of free visits to visual and performing arts venues, students also enjoyed paid visits to the fabulous performances of Hong Kong Arts Festival via the Young Friends Programme. 5A Chan Sin Ting and 4C Tom Kei Yiu were both awarded scholarships for their flair for arts in the "6th Arts Ambassadors-in-school Scheme" organized by Hong Kong Arts Development Council. In response to Other Learning Experiences in aesthetic development, visits to exhibitions and performances, workshops varied from mural paintings to art and crafts were introduced among students so as to help them experience arts.

5. Chinese Activities Promotion Team

The Chinese Activities Promotion Team raised incentives for students' learning and deepened their knowledge in Chinese culture through various kinds of activities such as singing contest, writing competition, lantern riddles and film show.

6. Putonghua Promotion Committee

Putonghua Promotion Committee is an organization which aims at promoting the use of Putonghua in students' daily lives. Students' interest in Putonghua was cultivated through diversified and appealing activities, like drama broadcast competition, singing contest, band shows and game stalls.

7. English Award Scheme

English Award Scheme (EAS) aims at enhancing students' motivation and interest in learning and using English through various activities. Whenever students want to immerse in an English speaking atmosphere at lunchtime or after school, they are welcome to visit the English Corner, which offers students the opportunities to enjoy an array of English board games, English songs or simply chitchat with their peers. This year, we also organized two Speaking Days per term, English Activity Days in April, and various reading, viewing and listening activities at different time intervals. Game booths, band shows, song dedications and singing contests were held to attract students with different interests to use the language in their everyday school life setting.

8. Environmental Education

Environmental education was implemented through both formal and informal curricula in our school this year. Our eco-team carried out several activities, for examples, energy saving activities, Young Environmental Protection Pioneers and less carbon emission activities. A board display for environmental education was held in November to enhance sense of environmental protection in our school. These activities aimed at inculcating into students an active involvement in reducing carbon dioxide concentration in our environment.

IV. SUPPORT FOR STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

The school theme of the year was "Learn to Learn, Learn to Respect".

1. Pastoral Care and Religious Education

The main aim of this section (PRES) was to coordinate the work of Christian Fellowship, Form Coodination Committee and Healthy School committee as well as the work of six other pastoral care sections to provide students with support. The PRES also implemented the following programmes:

- F.1 Adaptation Programme
- Student-Teacher Conference
- Cultural Week
- The Lamwooer Awards
- The APASO survey

2. Chaplain and Christian Fellowship

Besides regular meetings after school every Friday, the following activities were held:

- Students cell groups, Bible study group and prayer groups
- A Spiritual Renewal Meeting
- F.1 and F.2 Visit to SKH Crown of Thorns Church
- F.4 and F.5 Life Education co-organized with SKH Crown of Thorns Church and SKH Lady MacLehose Social Service Centre
- Gospel Week: Various activities for highlighting the theme of this year "Carnival". There were book exhibition, band show, orienteering games and Hymn Singing Contest. Mr. Roy Chow held a sharing meeting, while the Gospel Music Group of the Christtian Association, HKU held an evangelical meeting.
- Leadership Training Camp
- Summer Gospel Camp
- Lam Woo Mentorship Support Scheme by the Church of the Epiphany

3. Moral and Civic Education

- School assemblies and form teacher lessons were arranged on every Day 6 to foster students' spiritual growth and to promote moral, civic and life education. The topics of school assemblies and form teacher lessons were aligned with school concerns and focuses, such as "Active Learning" and "Character Building".
- National education activities were held around National Day, e.g. flag hoisting ceremony, talk, board display, video show and game stalls on contemporary China.
- - Ten classes visited the ICAC exhibition coach bus.
- - Twelve F.5 students won the 2nd runner up prize of 2014 Moot Court Competition.
- Our school won 2nd runner up prize in the Helping Hand Cookie Selling Competition in supporting the Elderly.
- About \$10,000 cooking oil was donated from Wing Han Education Fund. Students learnt the selling technique and used the money returned to buy other foods for food bank.
- - Twenty F.4 students joined the Guangxi Service tour.
- - Ten F.1 to F.3 students joined the Guangzhou Service Tour.
- Ten F.3 to F.5 students joined the Hangzhou Service Tour.

- 40 F.3 and F.4 students joined the Macau Study Tour.
- Thirty F.4 to F.5 students joined the Taiwan Study Tour.
- 4E Wong Yan Tung and 4B Suen Wing Tung won the champion and 2nd runner-up respectively in "International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking" slogan design competition

4. Discipline Section

To broaden the horizons of students and prepare them to face challenges ahead, police talks on prevention of drug abuse, bullying, computer crime, job traps and duty of policemen were organized.

School prefects, a strong force to maintain school discipline, contributes immensely to the school. To equip them with skills in handling their routine duty, two prefects training days on August 13 and a leadership training camp during Easter holidays were organized.

5. Guidance Section

The objectives of Guidance Section this year were to implement the school theme of honesty in Character Building and develop a sense of politeness and thankfulness in our students. The slogan was 'Give out your support; treasure what we got.' These were achieved with the efforts of Program Team, Outside School Service Team and Peer Counselor Team. We invited our alumni, Ms. Carol Wong Ka-po to share with us the mission and work of Health in Action in slums of Manila, Philippines. Other activities of the year included:

- The Guidance Week, Big Brother and Big Sister Scheme
- Social services provided to the elderly by organizing workshops to enrich students with experiences in handicraft and computer programs
- Peer Counselors were trained to help junior form students
- Regular programs on sex education, stress management, learning motivation and wise use of information from the internet held to equip students with knowledge and skills of facing the challenges encountered in their daily lives

7. Leadership Development

The main aims of Leadership Development Section (LDS) were to ensure leadership development of students aligns with the school mission, vision and needs of students; adopt a whole school approach in formulating leadership programs to cater students' needs; encourage students to reflect on and take charge of their own leadership development and provide timely and appropriate rewards for students' achievements. Apart from the above work, LDS also implemented the following programmes:

- Leadership Training, e.g. Outward Bound, Adventure Training Camps
- Mission Kaleidoscope Scheme for junior form students
- Task force groups, e.g. Sichuan Service Trip
- Commission Service
- Selection of DSA

8. Students' Union

The Students' Union serves as a bridge between students and the school. Other than routine services, some competitions and welfare services were organized this year, such as SU "Dancing Soul" Competition, Lamwooer Records, SU Forums, Democratic Wall, Puzzle Drama Competition and Leadership Training Programme for Junior Form Students. Some joint school functions were held with other schools such as Christmas Party, Oral Practices, Student Exchange Programme and Variety Show.

9. Houses

Apart from Sports Days, Inter-house Activities Days, Basketball Competition, Cheering Team Competition and Board Design Competition, we had Inter-house Quiz Bowl Tournament this year.

10. Extra-curricular Activities Section

The Extra-curricular Activities Section aimed at planning and providing interesting and educational activities for all the students. We coordinated more than 50 activity groups, inter-house competitions and school picnic. Besides, we provided community services for students and established the ECA information platform on our school webpage. We promoted and planned other learning experiences (OLE) for the NSS students, so as to widen their horizons and develop their potential.

We also set up the Student ECA Team and the Community Service Ambassador Team to promote extra-curricular activities and community services. The programmes held included ECA Introduction Week, ECA Leadership Training Programme, ECA Lunch Time Programme, Exhibition on Sharing Community Services and ECA Website Quiz. We helped organize community services for F.3 or above students. With students' good performance on serving, our school obtained the Two Stars Certificate of Recognition from the Social Welfare Department and the Commendation Certificate of Heart to Heart School from the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Group.

11. Student Health Promotion Committee

Vaccination Service, Dental Care Scheme, Healthy Food Selling Days and Sports Weeks were organized to foster a healthy, active lifestyle among students. Besides, three booklets were delivered to provide useful information of various health issues in order to help students lead a healthy life.

12. Parent-Teacher Association

PTA organized a number of activities, such as parents' talk, school uniform recycle campaigns, BBQ and F.1 support group meeting. The parents' group 「家」添茶座 organized eleven meetings. In January, parents prepared some delicious cookies for our F.6 students to cheer them up. They also prepared a delicious buffet lunch for all staff in the programme 「家長也敬 師」 in June. Eleven parents' fellowship meetings were organized for our parents.

The Volunteer Team assisted in examination invigilation, students' outing activities and library clerical work. Besides, PTA donated funds to subsidize various student activities such as Leadership Training Programme, Adventure Ship and the World Choir Games. PTA also organized fund-raising activities: uniform re-sale, 「一人一利是」 and gift sale. They raised about \$34,000 to support our student activities.


13. Old Students' Association


1. HKDSE Examination 2014

186 students at the HKDSE Examination and obtained 79 Level 5**, 200 Level 5* and 233 Level 5. As for outstanding individual achievement, Chan Chun Yin topped the list with 6 Level 5** and 1 Level 5*. 4 students obtained 4 Level 5** or above, 9 students obtained 3 Level 5** or above and 20 students obtained 2 level 5** or above. 138 students(74.2%) obtained 20 grade points or more for the best five subjects.(Remarks: 7 marks for Level 5**, 6 marks for Level 5*, 5 marks for Level 5, 4 marks for Level 4 and so on)

五、成效檢討

- 增潤課程整體成效令人滿意,正面評價不少。
- 導師普遍認為同學上課投入積極、勇於發問、秩序良好,有關課程值得舉辦,並享受導師工作,將來願意繼續擔任導師。
- 學生方面,九成同學認為課程程度適中,能引起學習興趣,有助提升個人閱讀文言文的能力(中一至中三)或說話能力(中四至中五);而同學對導師表現相當滿意,全部同學認同導師準備充足、講解清晰、協助同學改善問題,導師表現良好。
- 綜合而言,超過九成同學認為增潤課程值得參加。
- 同學雖對增潤課程評價頗高,但缺席的情況嚴重,由去年(2012-2013)中一至中五 4%及中六級 7%,大幅上升至 15%,同學缺席原因主要為兩類:一、比賽,二、生病(絕少無故缺席)。然同學報名參加增潤課程卻因事缺席,實在浪費資源,也影響學習進度。
- 此外,部份初中同學認為課程內容過及不切合文憑試程度(回應:在課程中段導師已反映, 已就相關題目向學生解釋,屬學生不熟悉公開試題型而生之誤會,已處理)。
- 初中導師認為文言增潤班課次太少,四堂對學生幫助效益不大,只能涉獵基本方法,建議增加課節。
- 同學亦建議把課程延伸至兩三個月,以便導師更深入教授及跟進同學的能力。

六、困難及建議

- 因應缺席情況嚴重,官研究更有效措施。
- 初中增加課節問題,待下學年(2014-2015 學年)再研究。
- 另中六級雖然需要迫切,唯學生學務繁重,有志參加增潤,唯時間上難以配合。
- 由於同學對導師評價相當高,建議繼續聘請本校畢業生擔任導師。
- 由導師整輯教材,較能切合學生需要,如導師能力可(如中大中文系畢業)也可由導師自 擬教材。
